Counselors and school administrators dealing with suicide or other traumatic events can quickly access clinical guidance through expanded Crisis Support Team project

Founded in 1997, The Jason Foundation has provided free suicide awareness and prevention curriculums to over 9,000 schools and youth organizations across the nation. The Foundation also offers professional development training for educators, and in 2018 alone facilitated 200,000 trainings through its national network.

Acadia and The Jason Foundation have collaborated for six years to amplify its suicide awareness and prevention programming through Acadia's regional offices in 40 states. The CST project was borne from this partnership and has been available to a small number of schools and youth organizations across the country since early 2019. This is the first statewide expansion of the CST project, which is the only national service of its kind.

Dr. Michael Genovese, chief medical officer of Acadia Healthcare, said, "The aftermath of any tragedy is an incredibly vulnerable time, especially for young people. School leaders are under tremendous pressure to take action and provide critical support in the wake of a crisis, but with rapidly changing clinical guidelines and evolving best practices, it can be hard to keep up with the latest recommendations. Having immediate access to the CST ensures schools have a place to turn for the expert guidance and direction necessary to more effectively manage a traumatic event."
